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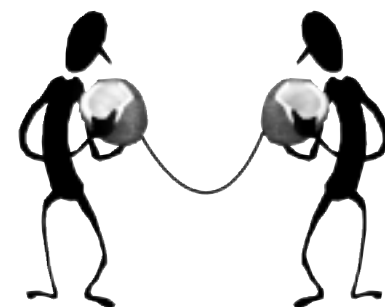

Paul spent most of his childhood in Michigan, St. Louis Missouri and Philadelphia, and then went to high school in Tennessee, where he learned to play the guitar from his best friend Bruce. "We were heavy into the Beatles back then. We learned to play most of their stuff. We just couldn't get enough", Paul said.

After school Paul wound up in college and after that spent 23 years as a uniformed

was playing guitar. Someone who heard the music asked him if he ever played professionally. Until that point it was a hobby, but it gave him pause to think, "Hey, maybe this could be a fun second career."

Paul retired to Key Largo in 2003 and kept playing music for fun until one of the owners of Sharkey's offered him a gig. With some help and support from Grateful Ted (another great local musician) he started his career. Paul also plays music from the Emerald Isle in the Key Largo Irish parade every St. Patrick's Day.

"I'm always expanding my repertoire. It's no fun just playing the same thing over and over. I've been playing some of my own stuff as well as music from the 1920's and some blues as well," explained Paul.
