





**Musician's Relief Fund and The Keys Disease**


Several years ago I was talking with my friend Ray Eubanks and mentioned that I had a dream of starting a fund to help musicians that were not able to work due to health reasons, but I was concerned that there would be a mountain of red tape involved with starting a non-profit. At the time Eubanks was the Exalted Ruler of the Elks Lodge in Tavernier. He said it might be possible to do it through the Elks because they are a non-profit. He went on to discover that the Elks organization was started by a group of musicians for just that reason, to help others and each other. Now we just needed some money.

About that time I was itching to publish a book. Sue Beal had written several humorous articles for the Coconut Telegraph on the Key's Disease and I thought it would make a fun book if I could just find an illustrator. At that time my friend John McKinna was sharing his previously syndicated cartoons in the Coconut Telegraph. Among John's many talents including best selling

author and cartoonist, John was a musician and a hell of a nice guy. The 3 of us agreed to donate all the profits to start the Musician's Relief Fund. Next we needed to find the funding to get the book printed.

I was excited and told Rob LeBrun, the manager of Gilbert's Resort at the time, all about it. He asked me how much it would cost to order the books? I told him \$600. He left and came back with a check for the full amount courtesy of Gilberts. Sadly before the book was printed John McKinna passed away. His wife Teresa became our partner.

Now we had the books to sell at \$10 each but we needed to generate some more money in order to give more. We planned a book signing party at Gilberts and I solicited donations of items from local merchants for the silent auction. We have a very generous business community who always donate, so I was flabbergasted when I stopped in a Key Largo boutique and the owner refused to donate. She was rather unpleasant and said that the

musicians "should just get another job."

Needless to say I don't shop in her store.

Some musicians do have 2 jobs to support their families. When they feel sick or get injured they can't work either of them. Plus, when they are not at a gig several nights a week, they are practicing.

The Musician's Relief Fund has over the years helped many musicians and most recently was able to write a check for \$1,000 to an outstanding local musician, Luke Sommer Glenn, who is in

need of a heart operation. Before I had a chance to tell Ray Eubanks the news, he passed away at a hospital in Sebring with his wife Pat by his side.

Terry Bouquenoey is the fund administrator at the Elks and he recently held a classic/antique car show to generate money. 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## Critters in our Midst: Key Largo Woodrat

Calusa Indians, Spaniards, wreckers, pirates, farmers, Bahamian fisherman, Conchs, homesteaders, hermits, land developers, the U.S. Government, collectors and conservationists have all laid claim to the Upper Keys. Each in

their own way have left their mark.

US1, the main route to the Florida Keys, contained the tourism and development for those seeking an exotic world of tropical adventure, and spared North Key Largo

from much attention.


I arrived in the Florida Keys in 1984 in my red Pinto station wagon containing all my belongings, including a windsurfer strapped to the roof. I took a left at the intersection of US1 and CR

and the acquisition of Port Bougainville by the State of Florida in 1982 were pivotal events securing the future of a natural N. Key Largo. The CLNWR is home to the endangered Key Largo woodrat, Key Largo cotton mouse, Stock Island tree snail, Schaus' swallowtail butterfly and American Crocodile.

There are many misconceptions about one of the protected species: the Key Largo woodrat. Very dissimilar from the black rat, the Key Largo woodrat is a nocturnal animal, that lives away from humans in the hammocks of North Key Largo. The woodrat is greyish

Some people see black rats like the ones attacking a bird feeder, and claim they are woodrats. A woman seated at the local bar was overheard saying: "I don't understand why the government is building houses for those rats in N. Key Largo". Her vision of woodrats occupying a three room dollhouse, complete with front porch, and a tin roof, is totally false.

Yes folks, they walk among us.

Prior to the 1980s, on both sides of CR-905 there were wheel-worn finger roads, about six ft. wide and as high as a pick-up truck, etched in the coral rock. These roads of formerly platted subdivisions became the dumping grounds for old refrigerators, discarded vehicles and construction debris. With public acquisition came cleaning up of the trash, some of which included piles of sticks indicative of nesting Key Largo woodrats.

Ralph and Clay DeGayner signed on to volunteer at the refuge because they wanted to see a woodrat. They became curious as to why the woodrats were not piling sticks, but instead making homes in the hollowed out bases of trees and under debris.

It became obvious that supplemental nests were needed. Ralph's idea of using discarded jet skis as nests was frowned upon by researchers, however he persisted, and jet skis were hauled into the woods, and covered with natural materials such as coral rock and tree debris. When they began working as nesting sites, Ralph says "some of my

best breeders," it changed everyone's minds.

Rodents are at the bottom of the food chain and their natural predators include snakes and raptors, along with non-native predators such as feral cats, and Burmese Python. Cameras were placed in the nests, which provided researchers with valuable information pertaining to reproduction, and what predators were in the vicinity, and eventually implicated feral cats as a major predator, attracted by the commotion the woodrats made while building their stick nests.

Ralph, born during the Great Depression, dedicated two decades of his life toward improving a habitat, that during his lifetime was nearly destroyed, so that a future generation could see a woodrat. Ralph's most memorable moment as a volunteer, came while spending time with conservation icon Jane Goodall, visiting thriving woodrat nests in the hammocks. After the visit, Goodall wrote: "a small group of dedicated persons, even volunteers with little scientific training, can help turn around an extinction event just by persisting in intelligent efforts."

Personally, I am not particularly bothered if I see an actual woodrat in my lifetime; I am just reassured by the passionate efforts of many to ensure their survival.





Ladies will be learning from the pros in Islamorada and Tavernier, FL plus there will be fishing, rigging, conservation and a fun Fishing Fever competition for beginners!

Aspiring anglers can learn, practice skills and go fishing at the award-winning "Ladies, Let's Go Fishing!®" Keys University and Fishing Fever Tournament, Oct. 7-9 in the Sport Fishing Capital of the World. Hosted by the nonprofit Ladies Let's Go Fishing Foundation, the "No-Yelling School of Fishing" offers classroom presentations, two networking events, hands-on skill practice and optional charter boat fishing. Classes will be held at the waterfront Elks Lodge in Tavernier. No equipment or experience is necessary.

Optional offshore or inshore charter fishing out of Islamorada, FL is offered on Friday and Sunday with prizes awarded for the LLGF Fishing Fever tournament. Participants can also choose to fish from their own boats.

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## God & The Settlers

This is why we have pearock.

Those plants grow in any type of soil, withstand drought and salt air, and multiply with abandon. The nectar from the long-lasting blossoms attracts butterflies, honey bees and flocks of song-birds. I expected to see a vast garden of colours by now. But, all I see are these green and white rectangles.

St. FRANCIS: It's the tribes that settled there, Lord, from all over North America. They started calling your flowers 'weeds' and went to great lengths to kill them and replace them with grass.

GOD: Grass? But, it's so boring. It's not colourful. It doesn't attract butterflies, birds and bees; only sandspurs and chinch bugs. It's sensitive to salt and drought. Do these settlers

really want all that grass growing there?

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
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## Matecumbe Historical Trust Labor Day Service In Memory Of Those Who Perished.

The Hurricane Monument memorializes hundreds of American Veterans and local citizens who died in the Great Hurricane of September 2, 1935. After World War 1, returning veterans were promised bonuses but were not paid. As the misery of the depression overtook the country, many remained unemployed and large groups assembled in Washington in 1934, demanding their money. The newly created Federal Emergency Relief Administration offered the unemployed veterans jobs. Over 600 of these men came to the Keys to help complete U.S. Highway One, adjacent to the railroad.





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
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## Friends of the Key Largo Library SEPTEMBER BOOK SALE

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



"Don't be flattered," she replied, "Take the money and buy yourself boots that fit."



