My landlord showed up a few months ago. First time we've seen her in about 10 years. Unfortunately, her husband isn't doing well, Parkinson's, and they're pretty sure they're going to have to sell the house that I've been renting for 12 years. I know, it had to happen eventually.

Her relatives from Ohio also arrived to help her sort out the upstairs. She also had another friend from Fort Lauderdale stay for a few days for moral support. The relatives were only here for a short while so they were on a mission to get things done and that's what they did.

My little dog barked at them every time they made a noise or came downstairs, which happened guite often, and as a result, I didn't get a whole lot of sleep for their entire visit. It's unsettling to have your space invaded when you are used to the relative tranguility of privacy. And having to remember to put on clothes and not pee in the backyard every time I went outside, geez.

They had a hard time understanding "Key's time," that we were incapable of being in their "mainland" hurry. In the meantime, my landlord suffered from bouts of sentimentality and changed her mind about selling the house several times a day. One minute she was asking about contractors to fix the place up and the next minute they were going to sell it as is.

I feel for her because she doesn't have the assistance of her husband and he wants to keep bicycles that he can no longer ride; that sentimentality thing. From all the stuff that came down, I

don't think they've ever thrown anything away... and there's still more stuff upstairs.

I'm a doer, I respond too quickly sometimes. With the price of housing in the Keys, it was a little disturbing to contemplate first, last and security when the bank account is lucky to have the first and some groceries for the week. I've always had a plan in the back of my mind for just this occasion. The wife and I always planned on retiring to an RV lifestyle as that's probably the only thing we can afford with my chosen profession.

I figured my one ton Transit van would be able to pull a decent, livable trailer. I was incorrect. It will barely pull a 5'x8' empty U-Haul. As we need the van to haul my music gear, it was determined that we would trade our 'almost paid off' Honda CRV for a Toyota truck with the I- Force V8 engine. With the Tundra, we can now pull a went back home after two livable trailer. Frozen tundra. Strange name for a truck, I think. Who gives a shit as long as it runs good, huh?

on for a trailer, which we negotiated and wheeled and dealed and got what we

figured was probably the best deal we were going to get just before the summer vacation rush. All with no money down. We were set to go pick the 37', 1.5 bath, super rig up. One and a half baths you asked? Damn right. After 12 years of sharing one shitter... We're getting too old to hold it or be rushed to finish. At least that's the dream anyway...

Then we realized there

was nowhere to put it. The last time I looked at RV lots they were \$450 a month. Now they cost that per day at a lot of places! And beyond that, there was nothing available for a 37 footer. Nothing that would accommodate parking for two vehicles, especially. So we had to cancel the RV purchase. 
The strange thing is, I'm trapped in paradise. There is no other place like the Keys where I can find enough work within a 100 mile drive to make a living. We have a slow season, but a lot of places have a no season, they completely shut down when business slows.

We're planning on pur-

chasing a newer model, bumper pull RV and we're looking for a place to put it. So, if anybody has a business or property they would like looked after, that's big enough to park our RV, plug into shore power and have a pump out service take care of that part of the situation. Nothing discourages busy bodies like 24 hour security. We can also pay a modest amount of rent, remember, I am a working musician so I make almost as much as a bus boy. It would be like supporting the arts... which is better than being an athletic supporter, though there is nothing wrong with supporting athletics.

When I reflect upon my work in the garden, I ask, "Am I keeping the plants in the garden alive, or is the garden keeping me alive?"

Gardeners nurture their plants by adding water, compost and nutrients, and by removing sunlight-blocking weeds. In return the plants produce abundant growth, flowers and edibles.

Oftentimes homeowners consider ornamental plants solely because they look good, are fast growing or are inexpensive... none or few redeeming qualities for life. Edible landscaping is a concept that replaces ornamental plants in the landscape with plants that produce food for humans. Planting for

wildlife is a form of edible landscaping, for the birds, bees, pollinators, small furry creatures, insects and reptiles in our midst. When we plant native plants, we are planting for wildlife.

The plants growing in our gardens tell a story. It may be as simple as the plant came with the house, or the birds planted the seeds as volunteers. When my sister Lillian comes to visit, she always brings cool and unusual plants. She brought fragrant lemongrass which is thriving, and a pomegranate tree which gifts me with delicious fruit. The Vanda orchid "Josephine" she brought came from a 100-year-old collection. Oh, the responsibility is

huge... thankfully the orchid is very happy near my pond.

Often trees are planted as a living tribute for a family member or friend who is no longer with us. In my yard, that plant is the Soursop, aka Guanabana (Annona muricata) planted for my former photography assistant Ronnie Navarro, who died from cancer. Over the course of his treatment involving chemotherapy and radiation, Ronnie would tell me what he'd learned about a natural anti-cancer alternative from the Soursop tree. Research and anecdotal accounts, not necessarily true or reliable, have shown Soursop leaves and stems consumed as a tea. and by eating the fruit, can benefit you by reducing inflammation and preventing/curing certain types of cancer. Ronnie planned on eating the fruit and drinking the tea as soon as he got out of the hospital. He never got that opportunity.

The two trees planted in Ronnie's honor have now expanded to ten, all from seeds that sprouted near the original trees. Each week I brew a batch of fresh Soursop tea. Maybe I am fighting cancer? The use of Soursop to prevent cancer is no more crazy a concept than traditional medicine's use of Coumadin, an anticoagulant, which is actually rat poison. If you can use rat poison as a blood thinner, then what's so strange about having fruit to prevent cancer? The lack of human studies and clinical trials doesn't stop me from experimenting with Soursop.

Food is medicine. The health benefits

from growing your own allows you to pick fruits and vegetables at their peak freshness and nutrition, In the Keys (zone 11) tropical fruit trees include Avocado, Mango, Figs, Carambola, Mulberry, Pomegranate, Loquat, and Soursop. Eggplant, okra, turmeric, ginger, lemon grass, pineapples, bananas, papaya, scallions, rosemary and other herbs grow year round. It is best to choose planting locations with early morning and late afternoon sunlight, and avoid the extreme heat. Fruits and vegetables need 6-8 hours of sunlight.

You can learn a lot about the plants that grow in the Keys when speaking



with our friends and neighbors who have lived in the Caribbean Islands or Central America. Often

the best and only medicines are found growing in their native landscape. Lemongrass is good for head congestion. Boil a pot of water and lemongrass for 5-10 minutes. Remove from the stove, cool until the mixture is warmish. Remove the grass. Sit in a bathtub and pour the water over the head to open sinuses. Aloe Vera calms burns, including sunburn, and helps heal wounds. A sprig of Rosemary in your water makes you smarter... well maybe not, but reading this article might!

Gardens... we nurture the plants and keep them alive, but what about the opposite? Not sure whether I am here to keep the plants alive, or they are here to extend my life. Can plants nurture our spirit as well as provide food and medicine? Truth is written on a stone in my garden: "An Hour in the Garden Puts Life's Problems in Perspective."






SOURSOP TEA

- GREEN OR BROWN SOURSOP LEAVES
- 12 CUPS OF BOILING WATER
- STAINLESS STEEL POT WITH LID
- Bring the water to a boil.
- Crush the soursop leaves (2-3 LEAVES PER CUP) in your palms, then add to boiling water.
- · Return to a full boil, stir, then turn down to simmer. Let simmer covered for 10 - 15 minutes or until leaves are a uniform color.
- Turn off heat. Cover with lid and let steep. Drink hot or cold
- Suggested serving is one 8 oz. cup of tea per day
- A Cran-Pomegranate juice "topper" adds sweetness

The whimsical artwork of Sara Reizen can be seen in numerous Just Older Youth (J.O.Y.) Center social media posts. It embodies the joy members at the J.O.Y. Center feel each week and the joy the new Board of Directors (President, John Cooper; Vice President, Eva Merkel; Secretary, Averil Kimble; and Treasurer, Dawn Cale) wants to spread to many more of our Upper Keys seasoned citizens.

If you missed it, the J.O.Y. Center moved to two days of programming at its new location at the Plantation Key Community Center (53 High Point Road) last year. From Yoga to ukulele, Mah Jongg to line dancing, crocheting to Five Crowns, there is a lot of variety for everyone. The newest courses include Belly Dancing and Tai Chi. Classes are free, but donations keep J.O.Y. afloat.

With more than 53% of Upper Keys residents aged 50 or older, the need for a place to find enrichment and community is growing. Having a place to learn, socialize, and have fun is crucial for mental, physical, and spiritual health. Having such a location where you have chosen to age in place is a gift. The dream for "the teen center for people over 50" in the Upper Keys is to have a permanent location open seven days a week. The commitment to make this happen is building momentum!

Three major areas of focus for J.O.Y. Center growth are:

- 1. Increase membership. In 2024, 551 individuals had 4,713 experiences at J.O.Y. Most members, 66%, said they heard about J.O.Y. from a friend. We need more friends!
- 2. Recruit enthusiastic volunteers. Most of the classes offered have come from someone volunteering to teach. Many hands make light work. We need more
- 3. Expand community partnerships. More classes and events offered over more days need more space and more funding. Imagine having a county commitment to having a space for our growing population wanting to age in place. We need more partners!



Kids these days - right?! They lounge around the house on their phone or maybe play a video game. Well, I have news for you! There is a place in town that offers a summer camp experience that can translate to a year-round (or maybe life-long) opportunity to enjoy and excel at something special to the Keys.

Between June and Aug 8th, the Mark Sorensen Youth Sailing Program (MSYSP) offers 9 week-long day camps (5 days a week 9am-3pm) at the Upper Keys Sailing Club in the heart of Key Largo. Sailboats of all sizes and training to all skill levels, paired with time on the water, is an exciting experience.

The youngest camp group is 6-7 years old. Basic sailors group is 8-12 and Advanced is

13-18. Coaches for the summer camp are Level 1 Certified sailing club members or past students and 8 students (or fewer) to one coach ensures quality guidance.

A week of camp runs \$350 for Keys kids (\$600 for 2 weeks) and \$475 a week for non-locals. Scholarships may be granted with an application process.

And the fun need not end with camp! There are sailing programs all year long at the Upper Keys Sailing Club as a part of the MSYSP. The "Buccaneers" have sailing events including the Buccaneer Blast - which is a huge 'blast,' believe me! Students can also become paid instructors by earning the Level 1 Certification. (There are also scholarships for that.)

John Sorensen, President of Programing, sees it as a family legacy and a way to give back to his Keys community. "Sailing teaches self-discipline and the problem-solving skills use math and science. These translate to a successful life. We expect respect and civility at the classes - and give respect in return."


Growing Pineapples in the U Florida was filled with pineapple plantations in the late 1800's. Long

before citrus, pineapples were being cultivated. Crates of the fruit were shipped by boats from the Florida Keys and Merritt Island on the east coast of Florida to cities in the northeast. They were nicknamed "pines," because they resembled a pine cone.

Florida Keys pineapples - In the rocky Florida Keys pineapple cultivation started in the 1860s. Benjamin Baker, known as "King of Wreckers" for his engagement in the business of salvaging ships, grew pineapples on Plantation Key, typically shipping them by schooner to New York, Baltimore and Philadelphia.

An article about Capt. Ben Baker's early pineapple plantation on Key Largo appeared in Harper's magazine in 1871. Dr J.B. Holder wrote of Baker's pineapple successes in his account, "Along the Florida Reef," After Holder revealed that Baker was making thousands of dollars farming the prickly fruit, other Bahamian families began to arrive and cultivate the Key Largo soil.







On July 20, 1969, as Commander of the Apollo 11 lunar module, Neil Armstrong was the first person to set foot on the moon.
